Biographical Sketch Paul A. Pastor, Jr.

Paul Pastor currently serves as Sheriff of Pierce County, Washington.

The Pierce County Sheriff's Department consists of 379 law enforcement officers, 322 Corrections Officers and 145 civilian personnel serving in Washington State's second largest County.

He was appointed Sheriff after serving for four years as the Chief of the Department's Operations Bureau in charge of all law enforcement operations.

Prior to taking this position, he served as Undersheriff for the Clark County Washington Sheriff's Office (1993 - 1996) and Chief of Police for the city of Everett, Washington (1991- 1992). From 1986 to 1991, he served at the rank of Inspector for the Pierce County Sheriff's Department.

In the early 1980's, he was in charge of State staff at the Washington Criminal Justice Training Academy where he also managed the Loaned Executive Program and Washington Crime Watch.

He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Pomona College as well as two Master's degrees and a Doctorate from Yale University.

He is a regular lecturer at the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia and has received two special commendations from the Director of the FBI for his contributions to law enforcement management training.

He is a graduate of the FBI's National Executive Institute and recently became a Senior Fellow in the American Leadership Forum.

He has commanded interagency operations in several high profile cases. He helped design the national model procedures for policing mass civil disturbance after World Trade Organization riot in Seattle. He consulted to the International Olympic Security Committee in Salt Lake City in 2001. He helped develop the Washington State law on police use of lethal force and the Northwest Law Enforcement Executive Command College.
